

He said: "The president-elect himself stated last week that his inauguration on 20 January is the 'quickest' path for any change in the occupant of the presidency.

"In light of this reality, I believe it will best serve our nation if Congress and the executive branch spend the next seven days completely focused on facilitating a safe inauguration and an orderly transfer of power to the incoming Biden administration."

Will Biden's Inauguration be disturbed by Trump's Supporters?



House Democrats have briefed about the protocols for Biden's inauguration; they state that there is an increased threat saying it as "chilling and horrific."

Ilhan Omar expressed his surety on the similar riot that occurred on Wednesday while informing about the measures to counter it, to which Conor Lamb provided further details.

The memory of Trump's supporters' violent revolt is still fresh in our minds.

Several top democrats claimed that more needs to be done, including Carolyn Maloney, Jerry Nadler, and Bennie Thompson of Mississippi, revealing their unity in propagating it under Congress's leadership and all state, local, and federal authorities.

FBI sent a memo to nationwide law-enforcement agencies warning about possible riots in 50 states capitols, while also revealing a threat of an armed group to stage an uprising in the Capitol as Trump will step down.

Chuck Schumer notified senators about a briefing to be received on Tuesday about the inauguration security Senate source claimed. Briefers will include representatives of Secret Service, Defense Department, and Homeland Security.

Additional security measures are in place in the Capitol. Monday's briefing also provided other parameters.

Videos went viral in social media after showing what happened to Senators Mitt Romney of Utah, and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina at the airport. As a result, members of congress will get increased security at airports.

House Administration Committee enlightened Democratic members about their rights over access to the government resources, including Members' Congressional Handbook.

Muriel Bowser asked about a state of emergency declared in the city.

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
