How Is Covid Contributing to Global Unemployment According to the UN?

According to UN labor specialists, the economic crisis created by the COVID epidemic is anticipated to result in worldwide unemployment of more than 200 million people next year, with women and young workers being the most affected.



In a recent study, the International

Labour Organization (ILO) also stated that while the world's nations "will emerge" from the current health crisis, "five years of efforts toward the elimination of working poverty have been undone."

Latin America and the Caribbean, Europe, and Central Asia have been the worst areas in the first half of 2021, all of which had uneven recoveries.

Working-hour losses were predicted to be more than 8% in the first quarter and 6% in the second quarter, significantly higher than the world average (of 4.8 and 4.4 percent, respectively). Women have been particularly affected by the crisis, with employment falling 5% in 2020 compared to 3.9 percent for males. Youth employment has suffered from the crisis, declining 8.7% in 2020 compared to 3.7 percent for adults.

The biggest drop has occurred in middle-income countries, where the implications of this delay and disruption in young people's early labor market experience "may continue for years," according to the ILO.

The City of Evanston Is the First to Issue Slavery Reparations – How Residents Are Reacting To It?



Black residents in the first US city to implement slavery reparations have criticized the \$25,000 payouts as "fake" compensation and said it "doesn't benefit me." In March, the people of Evanston, Illinois, approved the country's first slavery reparations system for black people, a \$400,000 program that was supposed to serve as a model for the rest of the country.

Nonetheless, the initiative has been slammed for enabling just 16 black persons to receive \$25,000 payments that may only be used for housing.

Residents also worry that there are too many restrictions on how the money may be spent under the scheme. According to NBC, it does not apply to renters because it is just for the present and prospective homeowners.

And even if black residents receive the funds, they will not be able to put down a deposit on a property in a city where average property prices are presently over \$400,000.

Residents have also highlighted that the funding would eventually go to banks and real estate businesses previously involved in the discriminatory practices that the initiative is attempting to rectify.

"Those who first inflicted the harm of redlining here in Evanston would be the benefactors of this program," community leader Sebastian Nalls told NBC.

Why Trump Scraped the Blog That Was Created After Social Media Ban?



Former President Donald Trump's short-lived blog has been shut down.

"It was really auxiliary to the wider activities we've [been] and are working on," Trump aide Jason Miller said, confirming the blog's closure. CNBC was the first to report the news.

After being banned from several social media networks, Trump used the blog to express himself openly. However, Internet traffic analytics revealed that it didn't receive any popularity when he launched it in early May.

As he decides whether to run for president a third time, Trump is expected to return to the campaign trail in 2022 to help Republicans retake control of the House and Senate.

Miller told NBC News last week, "He's pretty consistently maintained he'll make a decision after the midterms."

Trump is expected to speak at the Republican Party of North Carolina's convention on Saturday, and his campaign says he will hold many of his hallmark rallies in June and July. His supporters claim he is in a unique position to drive Republican voters to the polls next year.

Right now, Trump's major focus is on aiding pro-Trump Republicans in primaries who are up against more establishment-style candidates.
